About The Dax Centre:

The Dax Centre is a leader in the use of art to raise awareness and reduce stigma towards mental illness. Through our exhibitions and educational programs we seek to engage, inform and encourage community connections and conversations about mental health.

The Dax Centre houses the Cunningham Dax Collection, which is the largest collection of its kind in the southern hemisphere, and one of only three collections of this type in the world. The Cunningham Dax Collection consists of more than 16,000 artworks created by people who have experienced mental illness or psychological trauma. The Collection includes works on paper, canvases, photographs, textiles, sculptures, installations, artists' books and diaries, digital media and films. The Dax Centre conducts programs that utilise the Cunningham Dax Collection for students at all levels, as well as for the community at large.

The Dax Centre is named after Dr Eric Cunningham Dax (1908–2008). Dr Dax was a pioneer in the introduction of art programs into Victorian psychiatric hospitals for patients living with mental illness. This revolutionary idea resulted in the development of a wide and multifaceted approach using the creative arts to understand mental illness and promote mental health awareness.

Through the exhibition on the topic of Stigma and Mental Illness, we hope to provide artists with lived experience with an important opportunity to have their work exhibited, while advancing the Centre's guiding purpose to reduce stigma towards mental illness and increase awareness.

About the Exhibition:

At The Dax Centre we believe the opportunity to exhibit work and be involved in public programs supporting their work has a real and ongoing impact for artists with lived experience. For this reason, the main objective for this exhibition is to provide an opportunity for four to six youth artists to present artwork that explores the issues surrounding mental health for our exhibition, which will run for approximately sixteen weeks from mid-February until end of May 2020 (exact dates TBC), and will be the centre point of our education program during this time.

This exhibition has been made possible through the generous support of the Vizard Foundation.

Submission guidelines:

Some guidelines around the artwork submissions are:

- The artwork can be an entirely new work or be an existing piece or series, however preference will be given to work not previously exhibited.
- The artwork can be a one or a few large pieces, or a series of smaller artworks (we can't guarantee that all parts of a series can be exhibited as this is dependent on space).
- The artwork should ideally be two-dimensional, however some 3D art, or works that contain a 3D component will be considered providing they can be installed displayed within the limitations of our gallery space. We also have facilities to display audio-visual and virtual reality artworks.
- The artwork must be completed and available for delivery, photography, installation and display from 1 February 2020 until the end of the exhibition (end of May)
- The artwork will be on display during part of our peak education time – this includes primary school-aged groups, so artworks should be suitable for a young audience

Desired Exhibition Outcomes:

The aim of this exhibition is to provide artists with lived experience an opportunity to explore and exhibit their practice in a public gallery space.

Our ideal outcomes will include providing both the artists and visitors to the gallery with:

- reduced feelings of stigma/self-stigma,
- increased knowledge and awareness of complex mental illness,
- connection with others of similar lived experience,
- increased confidence and capacity to seek help.

Stipend:

The main objective of the exhibition is to provide artists with lived experience a platform to exhibit their artwork, increase awareness of the impact of stigma and increase empathy and understanding around mental health issues. However, we do value the time and energy that it takes to produce art, therefore a small artist fee of \$600 will be paid to exhibitors.

The exhibitors will also be provided with hard copies of the exhibition catalogue for their archives if one is printed.

Artwork will be returned to the artists after de-installation as early as reasonably possible.

Eligibility criteria:

- Artists must be no older than 30 at the time of art-making.
- Artists must be people who have lived experience of mental illness or psychological trauma
- Artists must reside in Victoria
- Artists must have an understanding and willingness to share part of their lived experience journey and story behind the artwork to facilitate the development and provision of the Education and Public programs accompanying the exhibition. Please contact us if you'd like to discuss

- Staff and family of staff members of The Dax Centre and Sane Australia are not eligible to apply.

Application process:

When submitting your application, please include some images or examples of your current art practice and a brief description. All attachments should be in .docx, .pdf, or .jpg format only.

As we are a small gallery space, we strongly recommend that you visit our gallery or contact us for more information about any size/logistical limitations prior to submitting your application.

Application Deadline: Submissions will be accepted from 9th September until 5pm 25th October, 2019

Selection Process:

Applications will be shortlisted by The Dax Centre team. The successful applicants will be notified by phone and email. Unsuccessful applicants will be notified by email.
